

Christmas Bird Count by Bill Rosevear

Twenty-nine people participated in this year's Christmas Bird Count. They saw 51 species (3,081 individuals). Here's a list: mallard (114), black duck (1), green-winged teal (2), bufflehead (9), Cooper's hawk (1), Northern harrier (2), red-tailed hawk (3), red-shouldered hawk (1), buteo sp. (1), kestrel (16), ruffed grouse (4), ring-necked pheasant (1), rock dove (235), mourning dove (118) great horned owl (2), belted kingfisher (9), yellow-shafted flicker (7), pileated woodpecker (10), red-headed woodpecker(3) hairy woodpecker (23), downy woodpecker (57), horned lark (80), blue jay (100), common crow (390), black-capped chickdee (156), tufted titmouse (79), hite-breasted nuthatch (64), brown creeper (8), winter wren (2), Carolina wren (15), mockingbird (10), robin (2), Eastern bluebird (37), golden-crowned kinglet (2), starling (400), common grackle (153), cardinal (83), purple

finch (14), house finch (151), pine siskin (8), American goldfinch (132), white-winged crossbill (1), rufous-sided towhee (3), junco (214), tree sparrow (33), chipping sparrow (4), white-throated sparrow (100), fox sparrow (1), song sparrow (19), and house sparrow (189). 
Homes Wanted
