### PITTSBURGH AVIARY

20 January 1990 Dave Kyler

The Pleasant Valley Shopping Center was the departure point for a day trip to Pittsburgh on the 20th of January. Our destination for that day was the amazing Pittsburgh Aviary, and its many feathered inhabitants. After boarding the rental van we encountered icy roads until we passed Cresson mountain where the sleet changed to rain. The remainder of the trip was wet, but not "wild".

Arriving at the aviary we were met by Chuck Teague, a naturalist, who led us on a two and one half hour tour through the many open, free-flying rooms. There open areas were warm and humid and filled with many species of beautiful birds. In the lush vegetation were colorful pairs either courting or in the process of nest building.

In the BRIDGE ROOM we found Wood Duck, Great Kiskadee, Sun Bittern as well as 68 other species. Blue-crowned Pigeon were nesting on a ledge as Crested Jays were begging for meal worms. The FOUNTAIN ROOM held paired Grey Hornbills, Montezuma Oropendola and the beautiful

Rothschild's Mynah, and 25 others. The noise and visual flights were amazing.

The DESERT ROOM held Greater Roadrunner, Blacksmith Plover and Double-stripped Thick-knee. These arid area dwellers were contained behind a vertical wire mesh but could be seen well. All of the special rooms were filled with thick vegetation and had painted murals as backdrops, to provide a proper setting.

My favorite room was the MARSH ROOM where herons, egrets, and teal were in a pool at your feet while Red Lorys were flying about your head. With a little imagination you would believe that you were

in the tropics.

After thanking Chuck for the tour we boarded the van, laden with souvenirs from the gift shop, and headed home. Supper was at Dean's Diner, near Blairsville, and was enjoyed by all. We arrived in Altoona at 7 P.M. having escaped dreary, mid-winter Pennsylvania, at least for part of a day.

Welcome to Spring! The weather is warming and the signs of Spring are appearing as we move into March. The tree buds are swelling as the roots send up the sap stored in the roots all winter. Soon the trees will be putting out new leaves ready for another season of growing. Also, maple trees collecting the sap that will be made into the syrup and sugar we like to eat. It is really quite a chore as it can take up to 50 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup! Flowers are pushing up into our world, also. Already a purplish cone-shaped flower from the skunk cabbage is up and attracting insects. Look for it in swampy and wet areas. Soon, the coltsfoot flower will be blooming along roadsides and empty lots. Coltsfoot looks a lot like a dandelion but will have no leaves until after it has flowered. 
