
ALTOONA AREA VO-TECH PROJECT by Nancy Morrison

Students enrolled in the Environmental Resources Program at the Altoona Area Vocational-Technical School, who are also members of the Juniata Valley Audubon Society, recently were escorted by Mr. James Burchfield, ERT instructor, to the Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area for a three day educational outing.

Part of the group's itinerary included study of the migratory and nonmigratory habits of birds, wildlife management, waterfowl management, and waterfowl identification. During this annual trip, this year's class experienced an unexpected and exciting opportunity. The students were permitted to assist in the duck banding program in part of the non-public area of the sanctuary. In addition, the group participated in sorting duck blind applications from part of the four thousand received by the Pennsylvania Game Commission each year. Approximately one thousand permits will be drawn at random for duck hunting blind use. The student work projects this year included a stream renovation and the maintenance of a 150 year old cemetery.

The Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area is operated by the Pennsylvania Game Commission on an eighteen hundred acre tract of wooded hills, farmland, and marshes located near the beautiful Middle Creek stream. The project is located on the Lancaster/Lebanon County border, southeast of Lebanon, Pennsylvania, between the towns of Kleinfeltersville and Cocalico on Route 897. The area includes a public hunting area, a propagation area (entry prohibited), wildlife management areas, and a public recreation area. The public can start a tour with the self-guided map beginning at the visitors' center, which exhibits thousands of wildlife inhabitants, and then view the first and largest nesting area for waterfowl at the pond below the visitors' overlook. Then one can drive to any or all of the five areas including hiking trails, propagation areas, ponds, grain fields, picnic areas, fishing areas, and the main dam area.

The students thoroughly enjoyed their visit to this wonderful conservation and wildlife management area and would encourage anyone to make a visit to Middle Creek.


