### PENNSYLVANIA VOLUNTEERS FOR WILDLIFE

The National Audubon Society, the Pennsylvania Game Commission, and the Wild Resources Conservation Fund have engaged in a cooperative effort over the past five years to offer Pennsylvanians a chance to share their knowledge and enthusiasm by participating in Volunteers for Wildlife Projects. Over one thousand citizens of the Commonwealth have responded to this call. In the past two years Juniata Valley Audubon Society members Stan and Alice Kotala have participated in the Summer Bat Trend Survey which was conducted at Fort Roberdeau County Park. Bill King, Mary Clark, and Fran Burgoon have monitored Bluebird boxes at Canoe Creek State Park as part of the Cavity Nesters Program. A Grassland Bird Survey in Sinking Valley was organized by Stan Kotala in 1991.


These multi-year inventory projects are a great help to the Pennsylvania Game Commission according to Jerry Hassinger, supervisor of PGC's Endangered and Protected Wildlife Unit. Support for comprehensive wildlife programs can be increased if opportunities are provided for personal involvement by volunteer citizens. "For new wildlife initiatives, or restoration of an endangered or uncommon species, new funding is not readily available. As a result, many states have gone to a tax check-off to help fund their programs. But even contributing your tax overpayment is nothing more than volunteered money. And it's never been a sufficient amount in any state to do an adequate job. To fill in that gap, we have come to rely heavily on volunteers," says Hassinger.


Additional Juniata Valley Audubon Society members are needed to participate in any of the following Volunteers for Wildlife projects:

- 1. BARN OWL NEST TRAIL: Build five barn owl nest boxes and monitor them.
- 2. BREEDING BIRD TREND SURVEY: Conduct bird censuses in a particular area.
- 3. PURPLE MARTIN TRAIL: Keep track of Martin house use.
- 4. GRASSLAND BIRD INDEX: Select a grassland area and monitor the occurrence of certain species of birds.
- 5. SUMMER BAT CONCENTRATION SURVEY: Count all bats exiting a specific site on evenings in the summer.




Cliff Swallow by Stan Kotala
