OPEN SPACE BOND REFERENDUM by Stan Kotala

An open space bond referendum will appear on the ballot on election day, November 2, 1993. If approved by Pennsylvania voters, this bond issue will provide for \$50 million to be distributed among the Bureau of State Parks, the Bureau of Forestry, the Department of Community Affairs, the Pennsylvania Game Commission, and the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission. This money will be used for the acquisition of additional land as well as improvements to existing sites. The question to appear on the ballot is as follows:

Do you favor the incurring of indebtedness by the Commonwealth of \$50,000,000 to provide for the funding of nature preserves and wildlife habitats, and for improvements to and expansion of state parks, community parks and recreation facilities, historic sites, zoos and public libraries?

It is of critical importance that all Audubon members go to the polls to vote "yes" on this referendum. Due to the dwindling availability of large tracts of open area, the increasing subdivision of land, and the upwardly-spiraling cost of "unimproved" land, this could very well be our last chance ever to save significant tracts of public open space for our children to enjoy!!

SUN PHOTOMETER ATMOSPHERIC NETWORK by Joel Christine

The Sun Photometer Atmospheric Network, or SPAN, is an effort by Forrest M. Mims III to set up a world-wide array of organizations and individuals to monitor the amount of ozone in the atmosphere along with some basic meteorological observations. The data would be taken at local noon to be sent back to a central location for use by scientists later on. An award by Rolex of 50,000 Swiss francs is to be used in the design and construction of 25 miniature electronic devices to obtain ozone data. After the one year pilot run, Mr. Mims hopes not only to prove the workability of SPAN, but also to enlist others in expanding the number of locations that are involved in various countries. Equipment would be made available for sale to anyone for their own station in the network.

The September/October issue of Audubon has an article about the problems with the ozone sensors on Nimbus-7 and Meteor-3; this is one reason for Mr. Mims' efforts to start SPAN. The other is to get amateur scientists and other people involved in efforts to understand the scientific work done around the world. NEW STATE NATURAL AREAS by Stan Kotala

Pennsylvania's Bureau of Forestry has proposed 18 new natural areas in our state forests. "Natural areas" are portions of our state forest in which timber harvesting, mineral development, and road construction are prohibited. Access is restricted to foot trails. Currently, there are 44 natural areas in the commonwealth. Three of these newly-proposed areas are in the south-central portion of the keystone state:

- 1. Rocky Ridge Natural Area in the Rothrock State Forest in Huntingdon County.

 This area exhibits unique limestone exposures, Oriskany cap rock, several sinkholes and plant species of special concern.
- 2. Mount Cydonia Ponds Natural Area in the Michaux State Forest in Franklin County. This has a series of significant vernal ponds and variable plant communities.
- 3. Beartown Woods Natural Area in the Michaux State Forest in Franklin County, which has an old growth northern hardwood forest unusual for southern Pennsylvania.

These are the first additions to the natural area program since 1975.




