Garden Club Federation Supports Bill

The Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania at its recent state board meeting in Philadelphia, approved Senate Bill 4, introduced by Sen. T. Newell Wood, which would make it inclawful for any person to package or bottle for sale or use, any malt or brewed heverage or soft drink in a non-returnable glass container within the Commonwealth and making it unlawful for any person to sell any such beverage or Soft drink so packaged or bottled for resale or ise in the Commonwealth. - April, 1971 Altoona Mirror
