ird Count Ever! Twenty-three counters were afield Sunday, December 17th on our 10th annual Christmas Census. What could be worse than all-day rain? High winds. The windy weather was most discouraging - nothing came easy - and a final tally of species anywhere near our best of last year seemed not to be ---but - the final tallying by all field people gave us the day: 50 total different species on count day and 4 additional species not observed on the 17th but seen in the "count period," i.e., 3 days before or after the count day. This over-all total of 54 is 2 better than last year's 50 + 2. And - there is next year: the ever present challenge. More observers and better knowledge of species habitat will get our totals higher. The great goal is 60 and it can

be done. For the period of 10 years our group has seen more than 75 different species. Some have been unusual but many are to be expected and it is this fact that allows us to predict the 60 or 65 future highs. Below is the final listing with the totals per species:

Total birds seen: 2,489

Most notable sightings include: rufous-sided towhees (John McCall & John Hancock), catbirds (1 @ Marcia & Stephen Bonta / Bill Rosevear), turkey (Dave Drew's party - 7 / Bill Murray - 1), and accipiter hawk (Coopers?/Sharp-Shinned?) (Lee McCartney - 1). The accipiter hawk and scaup duck are listed as "species" since it was not positively decided which of the two confusing birds was seen. The Greater and Lesser Scaups look alike as do the two accipiters.

A fine time was had again at the Skelp Grange Hall where counters tallied and all partook of a nice covered dish supper. In comparison, State College had 59 total species on December 17th. Birds they saw that we missed: Canada Goose, Ring-Necked Duck, Common Goldeneva, Bufflehead, Kuddy Duck, Hooded Merganser, Common Merganser, American Woodci, Ring-billed Gull, Common Raven, Red-Breasted Nuthatch, Brown Creeper, Eastern Bluebird, Ruby-Crowned Kinglet, and Swamp Sparrow. They are high on aquatic fowl and we just plain missed some easy ones! It would be nice to get together with State College and exchange information - especially on habitat expectations.
