The September Meeting: "Operation Osprey"

DATE: Tuesday, September 29th

TIME: 7:30 p.m.

A film produced by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, presented by Carrell Abbott, past president of the 3,000 member Audubon Society of Western Pennsylvania. The story is set in included and tells the story of the reintroduction of the magnificent "fish hawk" to that country. It is a close-up look at the daily life pattern of the osprey, from courtship and mating to the raising of the young. The telephoto photography gives the viewer a "lakeside seat" as the ospreys build the nest, dive for fish and nurture the young.

The film is a prize winning production and feetures wildlife photography of stunning, almost unbelievable quality. The narration is factual, filled with little-known details of the osprey's life process from egg to adult. Carrell Abbott will give an update on Pennsylvanis's efforts to reintroduce this bird of prey.
