

Thirteen years now, and the quest still holds promise and excitement. Looking for birds. Looking for one's self. We will be, as Byron said, conversing with Nature's charms and viewing her stores unrolled. Some will be out before daylight ready for the first crow while others will sing cantatas (Wilson and Teddie Kreitz, for example) before hearing other songs of an avian note. Some go dawn to dusk. Others put in an hour or so and more keep an eye at home on feeders and yards. It all adds up to a grand happening, a bird watching concentrate that infuses (our cup of tea, so to speak) a wonderful feeling in one and all. The count is fun. It's also a serious affair requiring us to be honest and accurate in the compilation of data that can be used to study such things as: bird populations, their fluctuations, and weather influences; fluctuations in ranges of certain species; winter range distribution; expansion or decline of species; the effects of changes in land use and the influences of urbanization; and identifying areas where endangered species winter and the need to protect such areas.

Members and non-members who want to take part in the count and have not yet been assigned to a team may get an assignment by calling count compiler John Orrat 943-5629. Everybody is welcome to attend the covered dish supper at the Skelp Grange Hall in Sinking Valley beginning at dusk. Just bring any entree (dish). Cassercle, dessert, breads, salads, etc. Drinks, utensils, condiments and such will be furnished as will be a large baked ham. The participant fees of counters will once again be paid by our group (courtesy of Madge Quick, treasurer). Counters afield should have very warm clothing, binoculars, good field guide, hot drink, and cookies. For new observers, a call in to the compiler would be the best way of getting a complete, quick rundown of details. Remember: if not sure, don't count! Any bird not normally encountered or expected in our area will have to be well documented. All identifying details must be written up and relayed to compiler. If identification is not certain, members will be intereted in your report of the unusual even though you can't count it. Birds may be identified by their songs alone. In covering an area assigned be most careful to mark rough landmarks for birds sighted so as to keep territories apart. Overlapois a big problem.

In 1980 we saw 61 different species for a new record. According to American Birds' special Christmas Bird Count issue, there were 1,358 counts in the U.S. last year. 33,802 people were afield counting a total of 49,060,380 birds. Pennsylvania had 47 counts; Glenolden, Pa. led with 107 species! Lancaster County had 97 species and Harrisburg had 84.

Good luck to all counters! Enlist the help of people within the count circle - especially feeder watchers. The circle is centered on Culp in Sinking Valley and is 15 miles in ciameter taking in Bellwood, Tyrone,

Tipton, East End, part of Juniata, Canoe Ck. State Park, Mt. Entna, Water Street, Spruce Creek and Birmingham. Anyone wanting to purchase the count issue should bring \$7.50 to the evening wind-up. The supper is most interesting for it is then that all teams report in and a grand tally is made. The event lasts until about 8:00 p.m. and for some is followed by a night search for owls. Children are welcome at the dinner and car pooling is recommended.

A Recipe for the Christmas Count

Old Fashioned Quaker Oats'

Famous Oatmeal Cookies:

3/4 cup shortening, 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup firmly-packed

brown sugar

1/2 cup granulated sugar

1 egg

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour 1 t aspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon soda

3 cups Oats, uncooked

1/4 cup water

Beat shortening, sugars, egg, water and vanilla together until creamy. Sift together flour, salt and soda; add to creamed mixture; blend well. Stir in Oats. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased cooked sheets. Bake in preheated moderate over (350°F.) 12 to 15 minutes. (For variety, add chopped walnuts.)
