Williamsburg Fire Tower Migration Watch

September 18th saw Al Burd, John Orr, Don Wharton and his son Donald gathered at a pancake house in Pleasant Valley early and out for a trip to the so-called Tussey Mt. fire tower near Stone Valley (on the other side of the mountain from Pine Grove Mills. A dark day with rain was not at all encouraging. Southernly hawk migrations usually stop during bad weather. One could give it a try just for finding out what does move in such weather but the group decided to scout out another fire tower just past the town of Williamsburg, lying south on the same mountain called Tussey.

Upon entering Williamsburg you keep straight on through and then head gradually up a rather high mountain. At the top is a state sign marking the entrance to the fire tower and a small parking area. Leaving the cars, it's a pleasant mile walk to a well kept state facility at the top of the ridge. The field trip that day turned up nothing for the rain and heavy clouds were quite bad. The road up has a lot of nice wildflowers and some interesting trees. White birches grow there as do scrub oak, chestnut oak and American chestnut. The trip showed that it doesn't matter what kind of a day it is - there is plenty one can see and do anytime, anywhere out of doors.

The following day Don Wharton returned to climb the same road to the tower and a breezy, sunny day gave him 24 broad-wings! He saw kettles of hawks soaring on the thermals and thus brings to us a good place for watching. It's easy to get to. If anyone takes a trip there they should keep a careful record of birds seen and then pass it in to Don for our regional bird records.
