The 1977 Regional Waterfowl Census

May 27th John Orr and Don Wharton spotted the following: 1 pied-billed grebe (lakemont); 2 buffleheads (male), 2 hooded mergansers (m/f), 1 female scaup (all at reservoir along Rt. #22 west of Ducansville); 19 male and 7 female ringnecks on upper hill Run res, along with 1 m. & 3 f. canvasbacks there; At the lower Mill Run res. were 3 m. & 1 f. buffleheads. At the 2nd Horseshoe Curve res. were 2 m. & 2 f. American widgeons and 3 m. ringnecks. Also at the lower Mill Run res., were 1 m. & 1 f. red-breasted mergansers.

Don Wharton and John Orr saw 51 different species of birds
Sunday, May 8th. Some of the good sightings were: Wilson's
snipe, lesser yellow-legs, solitary sandpiper, spotted sandpiper, ring-billed gulls
(12-15 at Canoe Creek), red-headed woodpecker, empidonax flycatcher (unable to tell
which of the 3 species it was), horned lark, rough-winged swallow, eastern bluebird,
yellow-throat (a warbler), yellow warbler, vesper sparrow, white crowned sparrow, swamp
sparrow, red-bellied woodpecker and yellow-throated vireo.

Collette Heller added the house finch and cowbird from Bellwood, and Lee McCartney saw 9 more different species to bring the over-all total for 4 observers to 62. (Not our best effort at in in the three years that we've counted). Lee saw a white-throated sparrow, yellow-bellied-sapsucker, pileated woodpecker, hummingbird, myrtle warbler, indigo bunting and American redstart, and others. (The more common birds are omitted from this May 8th listing.)

On April 26th Bob and Sue Montler saw a pied-billed grebe come onto their lawn. They cared for it until able to get it over to the Juniata Giver near their house in the Loop area of Hollidaysburg. In checking out this report Billy Orr spotted another of these small chicken-like birds in the Juniata near the bridge at the St. Bernardine Monastery just up the road from Montler's. Bill Rosevear reports a black-bellied plover at Prince Gallitzin Park on May 12th. It was along the water near the visitor center. It's an unusual migrant.
